Section 2: Noteworthy Incidents

15-23084 7/11/15 Shoplifting Arrest

Officer Bennett was traveling eastbound on Kings Hwy East and observed an Asian male operating a white Toyota Corolla with one grey door and a missing front

hubcap, matching the description of a vehicle wanted in a prior Shop lifting incident at Rite Aide (File 15-28806) in which a photo of the suspect and vehicle was put out to all personnel. Stratford police department has also been attempting to locate and identify the same subject for recent shoplifting incidents in their town.

Bennett observed the operator was not was not wearing a seatbelt and conducted a motor vehicle stop. Upon approaching the driver's side door it was evident the operator was the same subject pictured in the photograph from Rite Aid including the clothing description. Subsequent investigation and search resulted in the discovery of packages of shrimp and steak with labels from Whole Foods. Investigation revealed the accused was seen on video at Whole foods ordering the shrimp from the seafood department and then walking passed all points of sale without paying for the shrimp.

Accused had 22 prior arrests with several charges of Larceny 6th Degree, Possession of Narcotics and Violation of Probation. Accused was charged with Larceny 6th Degree, 53a-125b, as a result of the criminal investigation and charged with Operating a M/V with a suspended license 14-215 and Failure to wear a seatbelt 14-100

Arrest Warrants to be applied for past incidents.

15-23253 7/13/15 M/V Stop - Burglary tools

Officer Renaldi observed a green 1995 BMW 325I, traveling northbound on Black Rock Turnpike near the intersection of Congress Street without a front registration plate displayed. The vehicle made a left turn onto Bennington Drive which is a dead end road that leads to the Greenfield Hunt condominium complex. He conducted a motor vehicle and approached the vehicle, the driver side door opened and the lone black male operator tried to exit the vehicle. A PRAWN check revealed an active PRAWN warrant for Failure to Appear 2nd degree. The accused was taken into custody.

Subsequent on scene investigation and search revealed a small glass jar containing fragments of green plant-like substance, Garmin Nuvi GPS (Exhibit #2) lying on the front passenger seat with turn by turn directions leading to 2575 North Street in Fairfield. Further located was a Stryker Ogio, blue backpack which contained a pair of black leather gloves a black mini LED flashlight a Leatherman multi-tool and Epson folding utility knife and a Durapro window punch. There was also a large flat screwdriver (Exhibit #8) on the rear seat. These type of items are commonly

used in conjunction with burglary and larcenies from vehicles. Fairfield Police have investigated recent thefts from motor vehicles that consisted of stolen wallets, credit cards and identifications. The Detective Bureau took over the investigation into the recovered property.

The accused was arrested for Possession of Burglary Tools, CGS. 53a-106, Operating a Motor Vehicle Under Suspension and other Motor Vehicle Charges.

15-21342 /6/26/15 MISSING PERSON / SUICIDE ATTEMPT

Officer Guilfoyle and other patrols received a broadcast alerting all patrols to be on a lookout for a suicidal female, threatening suicide and driving a black 2006 Jeep Liberty.

Shelton PD conducted a GPS ping on her cell phone which placed her in the area of exit 44 of the Merritt Parkway. A a second ping recorded her phone in the area south of Lakewood Dr. ECC texted Guilfoyle a picture of the ping to be to the south of Lakewood Dr in the area Blackrock Congregational Church.

Guilfoyle checked the parking lot of the Black rock Congregation and spotted a black Jeep parked in the north area of the parking lot. The registration matched what was given.

He looked to the rear of the vehicle and spotted a female with her back to him and a brown leather weave belt around her neck that was hanging from the ceiling. He opened the door and attempted to untie the belt that was tied into a knot through the interior lift assist handle located above the left rear door. The female resisted all attempts to rescue her and would not allow Guilfoyle to untie the knot, she grabbed with both hands the end of the belt holding the knot in place and began to pull away causing the belt to tighten around her neck. The female began to yell, "leave me alone, let me finish!" Guilfoyle put Reaucci into a "bear hug" and lifted her up towards the ceiling, where the belt was tied in an attempt to ease the tightness of the belt.

Sergeant Gunter arrived on scene, reached in the vehicle and cut the belt. Once the belt

was cut, she was pulled out of the vehicle placed on the ground and Guilfoyle was able to get the rest of the belt free from around her neck. She was conscious and breathing and officers kept her lying on the ground and spoke with her for several minutes until she was calm.

She was transported to St. Vincent's Hospital for Psychological evaluation under an Emergency Committal Form (17a-503). The Shelton Police were notified that Ashley was located .

Dear Chief MacNamara:

Starting in late 2013, the U.S. Postal Inspection Service conducted an investigation into a large mail theft and check fraud operation. There were over 65 mail theft victims in Fairfield County who had their mail was stolen, but personal and convenience checks were targeted. The checks were used in two ways. First, checks were deposited into bank accounts and subsequently withdrawals were made on those accounts. Second, checks were used to purchase vehicles from individuals selling them on Craigslist. There were ten (10) victims in New Hampshire, New York, and New Jersey whose stolen checks were used to purchase vehicles. Some of these vehicles were resold by the subject(s) to cash buyers.

Dayquan Jackson and Eric Watkins were indicted on August 20, 2014. Dayquan Jackson pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit mail fraud on October 29, 2014 and was sentenced on March 5, 2015 to 55 months (4 years, 7 months) prison with three years' probation upon release. He was ordered to pay \$84,242 in restitution. On November 26, 2014. Eric Watkins pleaded guilty to mail fraud and was sentenced on February 26, 2015 to three (3) years' probation with four (4) months home confinement with electronic monitoring. Watkins was ordered to pay \$11,800 in restitution.

Detective George Buckmir was very instrumental in assisting the U.S. Postal Inspection Service during the bond revocation portion of this investigation. Detective Buckmir made himself available to testify in Jackson's bond revocation hearing. Without Detective Buckmir's vigilance in investigating a financial crime related to the above scheme, Dayquan Jackson would have remained out on bond for a few additional weeks until his self-surrender date. Jackson could have continued similar crimes while out on bond.

Partnerships in these and other investigations are of the utmost importance. On behalf of the United States Postal Inspection Service, please convey my gratitude to Detective Buckmir for all his hard work and commitment on this case. I look forward to the opportunity for our agencies to work together again in the future.
